FINANCING A WORLD CHURCH, PT. 2

In the first article of this series we looked at how God desires our giving to flow out of the joy and freedom we experience knowing that He is our Creator and Redeemer. In this issue I would like to review some of the basic Biblical principles upon which the financial system of the Seventh-day Adventist Church is built.

The first and foremost Biblical principle regarding finances is found in Colossians 1:16 NIV, "For by him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things were created through him and for him." This tells us that all we have belongs to God, yet He has given it to us to use. Further, it points out that He desires us to use what we have been given for God and to fulfill His purposes.

The second principle builds on the first and is found in Genesis 1:26 ESV, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness: and let them have dominion." God has appointed us to have dominion over all that is His here on Earth. We are to be His caretakers, to care for what belongs to God. Being made in the image and likeness of God shows us that God would like us to use His creation in a similar manner to how He would use them. To know how He would use them requires us to have a relationship with our God.

Romans 14:12 KJV gives us a third principle, "So then every one of us shall give account of himself to God." We are accountable for how we use what belongs to God. The parable of the talents in Matthew 25 shows us that we will be accountable to God for how we have used what He has given us. Here and now we are accountable to the cause and effect laws of nature. Organizationally we are also accountable to each other.

In Acts 4:32-37 we find an example of a fourth principle. The early Christians had organized themselves in a way where they all worked together in unity. Those who had means

helped those who did not. Verse 33 shows us this was not just a compassionate form of socialized welfare, it was a system that utilized the gifts of each individual for the spreading of the Gospel. Those who had the gift of means shared that wealth for the cause of the Gospel and those who had the gift of speaking shared the good news of the resurrection of Jesus. The Seventh-day Adventist Church approaches the allocation of resources with the understanding that all we have belongs to God and has sacrificially been given by His stewards. With this sacred trust the church must also take seriously its role to be good stewards and use these resources in the best way possible to forward God's purposes and kingdom.

Proverbs tells us that through the multitude of counselors there is wisdom and through the Bible and His servants, God reveals His will. The church works through committees at every level, from the local church to the General Conference. This allows more members to be involved in the decision making and helps them feel more a part of the mission. When we work through committees, the various gifts each person has been given are used to further the mission. The church selects people for committees who have demonstrated that God is active in their lives. Further, the committees are bathed with prayer. These practices allow God to reveal His will through the committees.

Another principle we can draw out of Acts 4 is the idea of the strong helping the weak. While the major portion of offerings stay at the local church and the major portion of tithe stays at the conference level, there are offerings taken that benefit the world-wide church and a portion of tithe helps to spread the Word in other parts of the globe. Without this system we would have a hard time reaching into all the world. Many parts of this world would not have an Adventist presence if it wasn't for our commitment to sending missionaries. Conferences like Alaska and Montana have vast territories and few resources; all of us within the North Pacific Union send a little bit to help these conferences. Recently the Idaho Conference has

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Idaho Conference Adventist Education in the 2020s

2019 was the beginning of the new quadrennium for the Idaho Conference. In the Education Department, we are looking forward to new plans which improve the education of our students.

1. FOCUS ON OUR STUDENTS' GROWTH IN CHRIST

The education and youth ministries are part of a three-faceted collaborative ministry to our children. The first part is home, where children initially learn about God's love and salvation. Parents instruct and model living for God to their children.

The second part is the local church. Through Sabbath School, Pathfinders and youth groups, children learn about the church body and how Christians serve God as a community of believers. The final part, Adventist education, continues educating children in God's Word daily— as well as other academic subjects.

THIS NEXT FOUR YEARS, WE WANT TO FOCUS ON THESE AREAS OF SPIRITUALITY:

a. Helping administrators and teachers to experience a deeper relationship with God and to whole-heartedly serve. In our busy lives and long hours of work, it is easy to not spend quality time with our Heavenly Father. We want to encourage and support our educators in maintaining their close walk with Him.

b. Emphasizing spirituality and Bible class to the same level as standard core subjects. Bible class should not be an "easy A." Good teachers have high expectations for students to learn God's Word. Helping them develop a good foundation in biblical truths from SDA worldview is important for future growth—and for those that don't have a relationship with Christ in their school years, a place to come back to later in life.

c. Developing school outreach activities that impact the non-SDA community. Biblical outreach focuses on reaching people through God's love, regardless if they are drawn to Christ. Having students work in outreach activities that minister directly to people in real ways can change both the recipients and the students.

2. CONTINUE TO MOVE TEACHERS TOWARD PROJECT-BASED LEARNING AND PROFICIENCY-BASED EDUCATION

We have been training our teachers in Project-Based Learning to make learning more practical and relevant. We will now also

of learning that is beyond just completing the homework. Students will need to demonstrate an understanding of how to consistently use what they learn before moving to new material. This can be easily used with PBL.

3. CONTINUE TO HIRE HIGH-QUALITY TEACHERS

This is the most important aspect that the Office of Education and Academy Administration are responsible for. The quality of a teacher can impact a school for greatness or decline because they have largest interaction with students and parents. In the last four years we have hired many great teachers. Do we have a 100% success rate? No, but we are striving toward that goal. God's leading is essential to finding great teachers.

4. IMPROVE THE NEW TEACHER MENTORING PROGRAM

New teachers need to have good mentoring to survive their early years while on the way to becoming great teachers. We are working to raise the quality of our mentoring through more formalized training of mentors for new teachers and increasing the period of mentoring to at least two years. This will hopefully lower new teacher frustration and possible burnout. Good mentors can guide and encourage new teachers to a thriving educational career.

5. WORK TOWARD HELPING TEACHERS TO BECOME STEM CERTIFIED

STEM is an acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering and Math education. Proficiency in these skills is important for 21st Century students and their future employment. Rather than teaching each of the STEM subjects separately, incorporating STEM into the curriculum allows educators to show students how these subjects are related, not only to each other, but to nearly every subject and discipline. Using a STEM approach challenges educators to offer students experiences that are hands-on, collaborative and open-ended, so they can apply the knowledge and techniques they learn throughout their lives. Speaker Bio

Hyveth Williams, Evenings/Sabbath Morning

Dr. Hyveth Williams served for over thirteen years as senior pastor of Campus Hill Church in Loma Linda, California. She is the first black female pastor and the first female senior pastor in the Seventh-day Adventist denomination. She was recently named Director of the Doctor of Ministry program and also serves as Professor of Homiletics in the Andrews University Theological Seminary.

A graduate of Columbia Union College with a Bachelor of Arts in Theology (1984), Pastor Williams received her Master of Divinity degree from Andrews University Theological Seminary (1989). In 1998 she graduated from Boston University School of Theology with a Doctor of Ministry degree. Dr. Williams holds the distinction of being the first non-Episcopalian to receive the prestigious

Fellowship from the Episcopal College of Preachers, National Cathedral, Washington, D.C.

She is the author of four books including her autobiography *Will I Ever Learn? One Woman's Life of Miracles and Ministry*. Articles by Pastor Williams have appeared in *Insight*, *Signs of the Times*, *Adventist Review*, *Ministry*, *Women of Spirit*, *Message* and *Celebration* magazines.

Dr. Williams is our evening and Sabbath morning speaker. We welcome her back again, as she was one of our speakers at last year's camp meeting.

After graduating from Pacific Union College, he became a youth pastor in the Northern California Conference before attending the SDA Theological Seminary at Andrews University. where he pastored and was conference evangelist. He has conducted evangelistic meetings and field schools of evangelism in a number of countries around the world.

Grant Agadjanian, Seminar Speaker

Grant Agadjanian was born of Armenian parents and raised in Russia as an atheist. After college, he was drafted to serve in the Soviet Army in 1980. Following his compulsory service in the army in Siberia, he was seriously ill due to the harsh climate. He spent six years in and out of hospitals. At the end of six years of illness, doctors said he had one year to live.

At that time a friend gave him a Bible. For the first time in his life, he had a Bible. As he read it and looked at nature, he came to believe that there is a God. As he acted on the principles in the Word of God, his health began to improve. His wife, Anne, was always searching for knowledge to improve his health and life.

Through God's providence, she bought a book titled, *Family and Health* in Russian (which is the combination of *Ministry of Healing* and *Adventist Home* by Ellen G. White).

After moving to the United States, Grant and his family were ultimately baptized in December 1994. Grant currently serves as president of Creative Media Ministries and leads weekends of revival across the country. He will be speaking on Praying for Children.

Beverly Sedlacek received her Doctorate in Nursing Practice from Andrews University. Her area of expertise is psychiatric nursing. She maintains a thriving private counseling practice, counseling hurting people in the areas of trauma, addiction, abuse, emotional problems and relationship and financial difficulties. Beverly serves as Clinical Director of Into His Rest Ministries, a Christian counseling ministry, where she conducts intensive weekend retreats with groups of women around the country, and frequently speaks at conferences and camp meetings around the world. She also writes.

She and her husband, David, have written a book and workbook entitled, *Cleansing the Sanctuary of the Heart: Tools for Emotional Healing*. When Beverly speaks, she is transparent about her own

journey of healing and invites the courageous to join her in God's work of restoration and cleansing the sanctuary of our hearts. She is passionate about Jesus, and making Him a living, real Savior for young and old alike. She summarizes her life mission through the text Luke 4:18: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. SAFETY

Certainly our system of operating the Seventh-day Adventist Church is not perfect. However, by understanding who our

resources ultimately belong to, using them for His purposes to the best of our ability, all of us banding together to benefit as many as possible has resulted in our denomination becoming the fastest growing church in North America. Overseas our church is growing twice as fast as it is here at home.

I invite you to renew your commitment to spreading the good news of Jesus' soon return.
